Emma's Story "I felt I wasn't ready to be a mother when I found myself pregnant at 23. I had always considered myself pro-life but I had no idea how difficult it would be to deal with a crisis pregnancy.

"I was blessed that I had two things that helped me through my pregnancy when things got tough. Firstly my faith, trusting that God had a plan for me and my baby, and secondly a supportive family.

"My pregnancy wasn't a joyful time. It was an extremely lonely, worrying time. I'm so glad the Eighth Amendment was there to protect me and my baby when I was feeling vulnerable and scared.

"My beautiful boy Rossa is now two years old. I can't imagine my life without him. He has brought a true happiness to my heart. Being a single mother can be a challenge at times but Rossa is such a joyful little boy who is loved by so many people.

"Many young women feel they have no choice other than abortion because they aren't ready to be mothers. I felt that I wasn't ready either but I'd like any woman in a similar situation to know that they can have their baby and their life will go on.

"I'm so thankful the Eighth Amendment was there to protect me from making a quick and rash decision when I was experiencing a crisis pregnancy. I often think if I had local access to abortion when I was feeling vulnerable I could have made a decision that I would have regretted later.

"I can honestly say that I am a much happier person now than I was before I got pregnant. Women need support in crisis pregnancy. They need to be told that they are strong enough to have their babies. My child is alive today thanks to the Eighth Amendment."

What will happen if the Eighth Amendment is repealed?

The Eighth Amendment protects the right to life of pregnant women and unborn babies *equally*. Without it, Ireland's abortion rate will rise dramatically. Statistics from the Department of Health UK reveal over 185,000 abortions were performed in 2016. When abortion was legalised in the UK in 1967, no one could have predicted that in just 50 years 1 in 5 British babies' lives would end in abortion every year. Similar rates are seen in Sweden (1 in 4), France and Spain (1 in 5), Italy and Portugal (1 in 6).

Why do abortions take place?

In 2016, 97% of abortions were performed in England and Wales for social reasons. Some 38% of the total number of abortions were performed on women who had at least one previous abortion. The rate of abortion was highest among women aged 22.

Our Common Humanity, Irish Bishops' message of March 2018

"Every one of us has a right to our life. It is not given to us by the Constitution of Ireland or by any law. We have it 'as of right', whether we are wealthy or poor, healthy or sick. All human beings have it.

"For us as a society to now declare that any category of human beings should have that right taken from them would be a shocking step. It effectively says that unborn children do not exist or, if they do, they do not count. That is a manifest injustice."

Reasons to cherish a culture of life

Life before birth

At the moment of conception, 23 chromosomes from the mother and 23 chromosomes form the father combine to create a new, unique human life. The combined 46 chromosomes contain the entire genetic blueprint of a new human life including gender, fingerprints, freckles, eye colour and blood type.

By day 21, a baby's heart is beating. Facial features are forming from week four. At just six weeks, the baby's eyes and eyelids, nose, mouth and internal organs have developed in their basic form.

The first movements occur at seven weeks. From week eight the nervous system is beginning to respond. From week nine the baby can yawn. From week 12 the baby can suck its thumb.
